"[The] Summer School in Dartington was very helpful for me. We had two lessons with Madeleine Mitchell. I played to her A. Dvořák's violin concerto. Masterclasses took place from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. In her class there were seven violin students coming from England, Germany and also from Turkey. We also played (a) lot of chamber music. I played piano trios and piano quartets. We played chamber music every day in the afternoon for three hours. At the last concert I played Bartok's duets for two violins with one student from Turkey. The concert took place in the Great Hall at Dartington.

As there were many nice and friendly people I was very happy to be there. It was a great experience for me."
